In her sermon, Liz explained that "this celebration is one way of living out this (Christian) life by serving together and committing ourselves to one another and to Christ in the ministry of this one church."

Her sermon focused on how we at St. John's all have a unique role that God has given us to play in our lifetime. At the same time, we are also all part of a whole, that "none of us can do it by ourselves". "We're all in this together to do the work and ministry of Christ," she urged. "In the waters of baptism, God has given to each one of us the gift of the Holy Spirit, so that we might do His work."

ith his soulful rendering of the hymn "How Great Thou Art", sung in both Hawaiian and English, John Bryan moved churchgoers to tears with his final performance. Better known to us as "JB", the Choir Director and local celebrity will leave for a one-year sabbatical to Japan. While in the city of Osaka, he will perform at Universal Studios. And what is "His work", and how do we as individuals and as Christians play a part in it?"There is a big harvest out there," Liz expounded, referring to the world around us. "It needs Christ, and we as a church are called to bring Christ to it...this aching world needs the peace and compassion of Christ. This world that confuses right from wrong and believes that truth is what we say it is needs the guidance of Christ."

One can't help but recognize Liz's fondness for symbolism. In fact, it is no coincidence that January 8—the start of a new year—was chosen for the date of the Installation—the start of a new spiritual leader for St. John's. The date also falls on both the start of St. John's 75th anniversary, as well as co-founder John Townsend's birthday.

Townsend helped bring great flavor to the community through his commitments to neighborhood outreach and bringing Christianity to the early 20th century Windward region. In Liz's own quiet way, her call to action seemed to summon Townsend's spirit. In a sense it was a nod to those who came before us, recognizing the responsibility to not forget our past. But at the same time, she recognized that because of who we are, we have the responsibility to take a stand with Christ in this new day and age.

"As you and I commit ourselves to going forward together in ministry, let us commit ourselves first of all to Christ," Liz summarized. "Let us commit each day to giving ourselves as a living sacrifice to Him. To allow Him to renew and transform us. So that we might do his ministry together and take his life and his work as laborers into his harvest."

coming Family Promise community project. Both are currently receiving training with other participating Windward churches. While final approval from the Diocese on insurance issues is pending, St. John's is moving forward with its commitment to provide overnight accommodations and meals for three to five homeless families, up to 15 people for one week on a rotating quarterly schedule.

St. John's start date will be May 14. This would give us ample time to prepare a month in advance and to avoid the busyness of the next few months. During this time, he also felt that now was a good time to get a "collection of bedding taken care of now." He also suggested that we ask now for volunteers to provide nightly supervision to the families and/or food preparation. About 45 volunteers are required for this project.

For Family Promise's part, the non-profit will provide transportation and twin sized beds for up to fifteen people. St. John's will provide meals and clean hand towels and bedding such as blankets and linen. While St. John's has shower facilities, Family Promise is not requiring us to provide the service.

Family Promise of Hawaii's mission is to mobilize the community to help low income families achieve and sustain their independence. Families stay at a host congregation during the evening and overnight. In the morning families are transported to the day center. At the day center families get ready for their daily activities, which may include caring for young children or going out to school or work, or to look for job or housing.

for at least the next three years. For the last few months, the BC has been gradually putting in pieces to the puzzle of aligning the growth goals of St. John's with the overall goals of conversion, transformation and evangelism set by the Diocese.

Liz emphasized in the meeting that the Diocese would not accept the goals the BC sets, if they are not aligned with the goals of the diocesan Strategic Plan or if they are unrealistic. Liz added that the strength of working on the three-year strategic plan would "save (St. John's) from focusing on monies yearly."

hishop's committee Annual Meeting in Review Highlights of the 01.26.06 Meeting

long with the election of new Bishop Committee members and delegates (see results on page four), there were several highlights during our Annual Meeting:

Liz called her first Annual Meeting since coming on-board seven months ago, she briefly reviewed several new ventures that are currently being implemented. Examples include Friday morning Bible studies and prayers, Wednesday evening healing services and her "Lunch with Liz" program where she spends time individually with churchgoers getting to know one another. At the same time, she is learning the traditions of St. John's such as our quarterly Hawaiian services, our mix of English and Hawaiian-language singing and the annual luau. She commended everyone for taking a step forward in improving how things are.

One key project that will hopefully become part of St. John's tradition is as host congregation with Family Promise (see page two.) Overwhelmingly, response to the program was "this is what churches should be doing".

Announcing the efforts the Bishop Committee will be taking with regards to St. John's strategic planning, Liz sees these steps as a "look ahead to the future." Her hopes, according to her report are for a "vital and growing Sunday School, adult education, new signage, (and) increased visibility."

efore announcing his retirement from his duties as Treasurer later this year, Pat Chu happily announced that St. John's is "for the first time since being Treasurer" profitable. This is largely because St. John's moved from having to support a fulltime vicar to a part-time one (Liz works part-time as Communications Officer at the Diocese and is Editor of the Hawaii Church Chronicle.) "We made it through 2005 with all the bills paid and a positive amount in the checking and savings accounts," Pat reported. "Our 2006 budget should provide us with a similar result" Last year's biggest project was the refurbishing of the vicarage for just under \$10,000; this year's is expected to be renovations to be done with Ho'okano Hall, including replacing of the lights and water-damaged ceiling tiles. When the meeting started to turn into everyone listing what needed to be done, BC Member Penny Chu kept the meeting on-track by proposing that the BC itemize what needs to be repaired and prioritize them at a later date.

utgoing Stewardship Committee Chair Mahi Beimes announced that pledges made so far is \$67,627—a decrease, compared to \$72, 818 last year.

Offsetting this decrease was, of course, Liz's employment as a part-time vicar. The previous year's pledge drive was in comparison a desperate push to make ends meet, supporting a full-time vicar. Despite the drop in pledges, Mahi countered that the "Bread of Life" stewardship program was highly successful—and a substantial improvement with last year's numbers. For example, the average pledge for 2006 is \$1691, compared to \$1500 last year. Taking into consideration the state and nation's economy with increased gasoline prices and exorbitant real property taxes, Mahi was encouraged by St. John's huge generosity.

She concluded her report praising Liz as "a part-time vicar who operates as if she were full-time, burning the candle at both ends." It was a sentiment that everyone proudly agreed.

amily Promise was a major highlight of the Malama Committee report with St. John's being heavily involved in the planning process at the moment. Co-coordinator David Gierlach explained how involved the project will be, requiring approximately 45 people involved in such activities as food preparation, gathering of supplies, supervision of the families, etc. One month before our May 14 start date on the project, Family Promise will provide necessary training to those involved. Six weeks before that, David and Malama Chair Tori Tualatamalelagi will be asking for groups of volunteers to help out for every day of the assigned week. "Basically we need people who can cook, to spend the night and to provide supplies," David said.

In addition, Tori noted that the committee would be getting back to providing monthly lunches for Habitat for Humanity-Windward work sites in Waimanalo, starting March 5. The brief break was due to the processing of applications from approval for the non-profit's clients with construction work resuming in March.

Another need by the Committee included more storage space for art supplies and for existing paper supplies for our kitchen in Ho`okano Hall. She noted that the Hall is experiencing a rodent problem, resulting in supplies needing to be stored in the Church office.

Lastly she brought up the issue on the kiln on our property. Being




